Farewell Speech of Former President Wei Liang

I am honored to serve as the president of the Association of Chinese Political Studies (ACPS) in 2015-2016. The ACPS has been an important part of my academic career and I greatly benefited from presenting my most recent research at the annual conferences, exchanging views and building networks at various ACPS-sponsored workshops, and getting my work published at JCPS. Therefore, it was a great pleasure for me to serve as board members for six years and president for the last two years. I was extremely fortunate to work with president-elect Edward Yang and a great Board of Directors: Zeng Jin, Zhang Wanfa, Zhang Ning, Steve Balla, and Li Xiaojun. We accomplished much and put together two outstanding conferences.

On June 6-7, 2015, we held the 28th annual conference in Beijing, China . The conference, entitled "China and the changing world order: domestic and international dimensions", was hosted by the ACPS and School of International Studies (SIS), Peking University. This timely and stimulating conference attracted 75 participants from 17 countries and regions, including U.S., Russia, Germany, Singapore, Pakistan, Mexico, Colombia, Chile, Canada, South Korea, United Kingdom

Israel, Japan, mainland China, Taiwan, Hong Kong and Macao. For the keynote speech given at the opening ceremony on June 6, President Wang Jisi of the Peking University Institute of International and Strategic Studies spoke on "One World, One Dream: China and International Order." For the keynote speech given at the conference banquet on June 7, General Zhou Chen, from Academy of Military Science of the Chinese People's Liberation Army on China's new defense policy.

We just finished this year's annual conference in Monterey, California on October 10-11. It was co-hosted by ACPS and Middlebury Institute of International Studies. The conference theme was "Domestic and Global Governance in the Era of China's "New Normal". This conference attracted 76 American and international scholars to present their recent research on China's domestic politics and international relations. Professor Margaret Pearson of University of Maryland and Professor Yan Jirong of Peking University were our keynote speaker at the conference. They both are prominent scholar specialized in China/IPE and public administration respectively and have published extensively in these areas. At the ACPS business meeting during the conference, Dr. Jessica Teets of Middlebury College was elected to become President-elect of ACPS.

Special Report on the 29th ACPS Annual Meeting Jointly Held with Middlebury Institute of International Studies, CA

If you have sharp ears and listen carefully at night in Hotel Pacific that houses the conference participants, you might hear the sea lions' roar from the Fisherman's Wharf in the Monterey Bay, California. This is the place that is immortalized by John Steinbeck, the winner of the 1962 Nobel Prize in Literature and "a giant of American letters", in his famous novels *Cannery Row*, *Tortilla Flat*, and *East of Eden*.

For the China scholars from around the world, this year's Monterey is the place where they meet and share their research and scholarship at the 29th ACPS annual meeting hosted by the Middlebury Institute of International Studies (MIIS).

The theme of this year's conference is "Domestic and Global Governance in the Era of China's 'New Normal," which attracts more than 70 participants from America, Asia and Europe. The two-day long gathering is kicked off with a reception in the boardroom of McCone Building on the evening of October 9, followed by two days' formal proceedings.

The first day's (October 10) meeting is opened by President Wei Liang who introduces the organization and arrangement of the meeting. Then Dean Kent Glenzer of the Graduate School of International Policy and Management and Vice President Jeff Dayton Johnson of MIIS expressed their welcome to the attendees of the conference. Professor Margaret Pearson from the University of Maryland delivers a keynote speech, summarizing the state of China studies in the social science field and reporting the most recent progress and development in the discipline. As a tradition of the ACPS, all participants have a group photo taken outside of Casa Fuente, the main location of the conference during the morning break.

Six panels are held the first day, two in the morning and four in the afternoon. Each session has two concurrent panels, one is devoted to China's domestic issues and the other focuses on the country's foreign relations.

The arrangement of the second day (October 11) is more intense with two pairs of concurrent panels being held in the morning and two in the afternoon respectively. The highlights arrive during the lunch, during which a second keynote speech was delivered by Professor Yan Jirong from Peking University in Samson Center. Professor Yan introduces the most recent developments in China's

political reforms and discusses the progress, obstacles and prospects of China's political development and public administration in the future.

The second highlight follows Professor Yan's speech--the election for future president and board members of the ACPS during the term 2016-2018. Dr. Yi Edward Yang, associate professor of political science at James Madison University and president-elect from the previous term, formally assumes his office. Dr. Jessica Teets, associate professor of political science at MIIS and the associate editor of the flagship journal of the ACPS-Journal of Chinese Political Studies, is elected president for the term 2018-2020. All other board members of the current term 2014-2016, such as treasurer and research director, are re-elected, hence will retain their current positions.

The conference is concluded with the closing remarks by the incumbent president Dr. Yi Edward Yang in the Irvine Auditorium in McCone Building at 5:30pm. In his remarks, President Yang first expresses his appreciation to all participants in the conference, all assistants who have helped with the organization of the activities, and all other supporters for the ACPS. The organization will not have grown to its current status and achieved what it has without them. President Yang also lays out his plans and ambitions for the future of the organization during his presidency.

There are three things that are noteworthy for this year's conference. First, the host institution MIIS has provided a full course high quality simultaneous two way English-Chinese translations from the beginning to the end, for each speaker or presenter at each panel. This is the first time that an ACPS conference has received such a privilege thanks to the superb logistics provided by MIIS. This service greatly facilitates the conference for the participants who have deficiencies in either one of the two languages. Second, this is the second time that the ACPS holds simultaneous panels during the meeting, following last year's conference at Peking University. It proves the growth of the ACPS in membership and the number of papers received. Third, two ex-presidents, Professor Baogang Guo (2008-2010) and Professor Jean Marc Blanchard (2010-2012), have also presented their papers at the meeting, showing their continuous support for the organization. They also share their academic and management experiences with the ACPS members during the breaks.






Steven Balla served as a Fulbright Scholar at the Zhou Enlai School of Government at Nankai University in Tianjin during the 2015-2016 academic year.


Jean-Marc Blanchard joined the School of Advanced International and Area Studies at East China Normal University (Shanghai) as a Distinguished Professor while continuing to serve as Executive Director of the Mr. & Mrs. S.H. Wong Center for the Study of Multinational Corporations (USA), a non-profit think tank focused on the politico-economy of foreign direct investment/multinational corporations in and from East Asia. In Fall 2015, he also became the editor of the "Palgrave Studies in Asia-Pacific Political Economy" book series. He also edited a special issue on Chinese relations with Latin America that will appear in Asian Perspective, Vol. 40, No. 4 (Oct.-December 2016) and published an article entitled "The Political-Economy of China's Contemporary Latin American Relations: Issues, Findings, and Prospects" that will appear in this volume.



In May 2016, Beijing Normal University invited him to teach a short course on "Environmental Education" to undergraduate and graduate students in education. He also lectured at the University of International Business and Economics on the 2016 U.S. presidential election. From February through May, the Alaska Department of Law retained Jerry as an expert witness on a challenge, in U.S. District Court, of the Republican Party against Alaska's stringent campaign finance laws. Most important for Jerry, however, was the birth of his second grandchild Ellie McBeath Zilkha on October 7th.

Jessica Teets was recently appointed non-resident senior fellow at the China Policy Institute at the University of Nottingham.
