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A Report of the 18th Annual Meeting of ACPS

The ACPS successfully concluded its 18th annual meeting on China's transition and ascension at San Francisco State University from July 30-31, 2005. The conference was hosted and co-sponsored by the College of Behavioral and Social Sciences at San Francisco State University. The Department of Political Science of SFSU and the Interna-

tional Graduate Programs of Old Dominion University also cosponsored this conference. The conference received a wide-range coverage by the local Chinese media organizations, such as Sing Tao, World Journal, Ming Pao, and local TV Channel

The Best Paper Award

The Best Paper Selection Committee is pleased to announce that this year's winner of the Best Paper Award goes to Dr. John Kennedy, assistant professor of political science at University of Kansas.

Dr. Kennedy's paper, titled "Death of a Township: Impact of the 2002 Tax-for-Fee Reform in Northwest China," explains how the recent elimination of agricultural taxes in China, while lightening the financial burdens on rural farmers, has threatened the existence of some township governments who depended on these taxes for their survival, and reduced township governmental autonomy, making them more dependant on county governments and their funds.

This well-researched, well-argued, and well-written paper provides a highly nuanced and richly documented analysis of China's rural administrative sys-



tem. Kennedy's research shows that the townships have completely lost the ability to generate funds from its residents for local expenditures because of the elimination of the TFR program. Particularly, it draws attention to the hitherto unknown linkages between tax reform and its unintended impact on the reorganization of the rural administrative capacity in China.

The Best Paper Award will be presented to him during our upcoming ACPS meeting in Louisville in April, 2006. This is the first time ACPS has offered such a award. The Selection Committee was established during the July meeting at San Francisco State University. Its members include Baogang Guo (chair), Greg More and Srini Sitaraman. The committee received seven nominated papers from the many papers presented to the annual meeting. The superb quality of the paper nominated by panel chairs has made the selection decision a difficult one. The committee has stipulated a set of rules and criteria, which is published on page 5.

It is the time of the year that you may want to renew your membership of the Association of Chinese Political Studies (ACPS). Last year, we received over \$6,000 in support from our members through our "letters campaign," the first since the founding of the organization in 1986. We used the money primarily for holding the 18th annual meeting in San Francisco in August 2005 which attracted over 60 participants from all over the world. Our membership has more than doubled in

the last year, reaching 318.

The association is a scholarly organization that was founded in the United States in 1986, its mission being to promote the understanding of Chinese politics and society among China scholars in China, the US and around the world. Privileges and benefits of regular members include: (1) subsidies to attend our annual meetings both in the United States and China; (2) opportunities to participate in ACPS-sponsored panels at

annual APSA meetings; (3) free access to our newsletters, list serve discussions on contemporary Chinese politics, and the electronic version of our journal, Journal of Chinese Political Science (JCPS).

and/or to be published in an edited book; (4) and/or to be included in the Occasional Papers published by IDD. The Best Papers Selection Committee is chaired by Professor Guo Baogang (bguo@daltonstate.edu). JCPS, edited by Professor Guo Sujian (sguo@sfsu.edu), is a refereed academic journal that has been publishing for almost a decade. We have also been able to publish an edited book for each of the ACPS annual meetings since 2000. Our collection of papers for the 2004 annual meeting were edited by

Zhong Yang and Hua Shiping and are in press with World Scientific Press. A book from the 2005 annual meeting in San Francisco, *The Beijing-Taipei-Washington Triangle*, is edited by Hua Shiping and will be published by Palgrave-Mcmillan Press in 2006. Another book titled *China's "peaceful rise" in the 21st Century*, edited by Sujian Guo, will be published by Ashgate Publishing Ltd. in 2006.

The central theme of the conference is on China's reform, development, transition, ascension, and global impact. China's reform, open-up, and development over the last two decades have made enormous impact on the political, economic and cultural lives of the Chinese people as well as on the rest of the world. China's transition and rise have become the two major themes in the field of China studies across all

academic disciplines. The conference brought together about 60 scholars and experts from the United States, Canada, China, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Macau, and Australia, and also attracted some of the nation's foremost China scholars, such as Lynn White III of Princeton, Lowell Dittmer of UC Berkeley, and Brantly Womack of University of Virginia, Robert Gamer of University of Missouri. Deans and associate deans of School of International Studies of Renmin University of China also attended the conference. At the conference, our association members and distinguished scholars from different areas came together to exchange their research and findings on the topics related to the broad theme of the conference. There were 13 panels, 2 roundtables, and 2 featured panels. Participants explored a wide variety of topics related to the central theme.

At the conference, Professor Joel Kassiola, Dean of BSS College of SFSU, delivered a warm welcome speech that addressed the issue of China's environmental and sustainable development in the process of modernization. Professor Lynn White III of Princeton University delivered his keynote speech on the conference's central theme and synthesized major aspects of China's reform, opening-up, development, consequences, problems, and challenges. ACPS Calls for Proposals for the 2006 APSA Annual Meeting in Philadelphia, PA on August 31 - Sept 3, 2006. The theme of the ACPS panel is "Is Hu Jintao a Reformer? China's Political Reform in the Age of Hu" When Hu Jintao assumed leadership, many in the West predicted Hu as a liberal reformer. This was especially likely given his past association with

reform leader Hu Yaobang. However, recent developments seem to indicate that Hu's political style is far more complex than many believed. So ACPS solicits proposals for the 2006 APSA annual meeting that will examine the likely course of political reforms under Hu Jintao's leadership as well as the political challenges that his regime may encounter in the next decade. 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ACPS and Renmin University Signed a Partnership Agreement

During the 18th ACPS Annual meeting held at San Francisco State University, ACPS and Renmin University signed a long-term partnership agreement. The following is the full text of the agreement.

AGREEMENT

This is an agreement between the Association of Chinese Political Studies (ACPS) and School of International Studies of Renmin University of China (SIS) for the purpose of establishing a long-term partnership between the two parties.

ACPS and SIS recently reviewed with satisfaction the cooperations between the two parties in the past, especially the jointly held international conferences in Beijing in 2002 and 2004. In view of the success of the previous cooperations, ACPS and SIS have reached an agreement for further cooperation between the two parties.

ACPS and SIS have decided that the two parties will, in principle, hold joint conferences every other year in Beijing.

ACPS' responsibilities are: (1) publicity about the conference outside of mainland China; (2) selecting conference papers written in English; (3) finding an outlet of publication in English outside of mainland China (under certain circumstances, the outlet could be in Macau and Hong Kong).

SIS' responsibilities are: (1) finding the financial resources that

cover the cost of local logistics, including conference costs, meals, hotel accommodations and local transportation while the conference is in session; (2) selecting conference papers written in Chinese; (3) the publication of conference proceedings.

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ACPS Best Paper Award Selection Rules

The following procedures and criteria were approved by the Board of Directors:

Procedures:

- (1) Each panel chair in consultation with his/her panel discussant nominates one paper for his/her panel; and he or she shall submit the nominated paper with a nomination comment, which states the rational for the nomination, within three months after the annual meeting.
- (2) Each member of the Selection Committee will be randomly assigned an

- equal number of papers nominated by each panel chair. He or she will make one recommendation to the committee for the final list.
- (3) The committee can choose among the three finalists one winner with a majority vote.
- (4) The committee will report the result to the President of the ACPS, and the President shall issue a Certificate of Honor to recipient(s) at the next year's annual meeting.
- (5) The papers from members of the Selection Committee should be ex-

cluded from the nomination process.

Nomination and Selection Criteria

- (1) The Best Paper Award honors the author(s) of a paper dealing with a subject related to any of the Association's academic scopes.
- (2) The finished paper must be presented at a previous year's annual meeting of the ACPS.
- (3) The paper must demonstrate highest scholarly standards and exceptional merits.

JCPS Calls For Contributions

The Journal of Chinese Political Science is a refereed academic journal that publishes theoretical, policy, and empirical research articles, research notes, and review articles on contemporary Chinese politics across the whole spectrum of political science and on different aspects of contemporary China with interdisciplinary perspectives and approaches to issues and problems related to Chinese politics, political economy, political culture, reform and opening, development, the military, law and legal system, foreign relations, and other important issues of political significance. JCPS articles are abstracted and indexed in OCLC, PAIS International, International Political Science Abstracts, Historical Abstracts, America: History and Life, Sociological Abstracts, Social Services Abstracts, Worldwide Political Science Abstracts, and EBSCO Database.

The editorial office prefers electronic submission. An electronic file of the manuscript, saved in Windows/Microsoft Word format, must be submitted via email to Dr. Sujian Guo at icps@sfsu.edu. This will speed up review process and publication and reduce the probability of typesetting errors. Both text and endnotes should be double-spaced throughout, on 8.5x11 inch paper. Since all manuscripts are subject to external reviews, author's name, title/position, affiliated institution, mailing address, email address, telephone and fax numbers, brief biographical



information, and an abstract of 100-120 words should be included in a separate title page and submitted together with the manuscript via email.

Manuscripts should conform to the styling of *Journal of Chinese Political Science*: Manuscripts should be submitted in clear and grammatically correct English. Authors must ensure that manuscripts have been proofread by a person with excellent command of the language. No manuscript will be considered if it is concurrently under consideration by another journal or is soon to be published elsewhere. The author is responsible for obtaining permission to publish any copyrighted material.
