# The 19th Annual Meeting a Success

The 19th ACPS annual conference hosted such as New England, California, by the Institute for Democracy and Development, together with the McConnell Center for Political Leadership, at the University of Louisville, was a success. About 70 papers by scholars from North America, Asia, Western Europe, and Australia, were presented at the conference. Some participants who didn't present papers came all the way from areas

Georgia, and Arkansas at their own expenses. Over two dozen people from the Louisville area also participated in the conference.

Six universities from mainland China were represented in this conference: Renmin University, Peking University, Fudan University, Nankai University, Shanghai

Jiaotong University, and Shanghai University of Finance and Economics. Renmin University's seven-member delegation was headed by Professor Li Jingzhi, Dean of the School of International Studies. Hong Kong was represented by the City University of Hong Kong. Taiwan was represented by National Chengchi University and National Changhua University of Education.

Domestically, leading universities that were represented at the conference include: University of Notre Dam, University of California at Berkeley, University of Virginia, Boston College, and Syracuse University. Leading research institu-

tions such as Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars were also represented at this conference.

At the opening ceremony, Dr. Baogang Guo, Chair of the Best Paper Selection Committee, presented "Best Paper Award" to Dr. John Kennedy, Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of Kansas. Dr. Sujian Guo, representing the board, presented "Distinguished Service and Leadership Award" to Dr. Shiping Hua for his two year service as the ACPS President.

U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell, spoke about China at the confer-

ence. The keynote speaker, Dr. Lowell Dittmer, spoke about the study of Chinese political culture. In accordance with the ACPS bylaws, Dr. Shiping Hua retired as the ACPS president after serving for two years and Dr. Sujian Guo assumed presidency, after serving as President-elect for two years. Dr. Baogang Guo was elected unanimously as the new Presidentelect. A new board was also elected: Dr. Sujian Guo, Dr. Baogang Guo, Dr. Jean-Marc F. Blanchard, Dr. Barrett L. McCormick. Dr. Greg Moore, Dr. Jianwei Wang, and Dr. Yanmin Yu.



# Associational Developments 2004-06

At the 19<sup>th</sup> ACPS conference, Professor Shiping Hua, who served as the ACPS President during the period of 2004-06, summarized the developments of ACPS in the past two years. These developments include the enactment of ACPS bylaws; one international conference in Beijing in 2004 and two annual meetings in the United States in 2005-06; one conference book in 2004 published by World Scientific, and two conference books in 2005 accepted by Ashgate and Palgrave for publication in 2006. We have continued to publish a refereed academic journal for a decade. Our membership has become increasingly diverse in gender and ethnic background. For example, among the 80 participants of the 19<sup>th</sup> annual conference, 21 are non-ethnic Chinese. This percentage roughly corresponds to the actually percentage of all our membership. We have seven board mem-

bers that are also diverse in terms of gender and ethnic backgrounds. Financially, in the last two years, we have seen revenue increase to \$33,300, of which \$12,000 is from our members. Overall, our association keeps growing and will continue to grow into a more professionalized scholarly organization in Chinese political studies, providing a forum for China scholars in exchange of academic views and scholarly work.

### **Purpose:**

The six organizations are registered in the United States, although some members of these organizations reside outside of North America. Despite the fact that these six organizations have different disciplinary emphases, they share the common aim of studying and promoting China studies in the world, especially in the United States and in Greater China. In establishing such an umbrella organization, USCS serves the purpose of better promoting China studies globally.

### Mission:

The mission of USCS is primarily that of promoting information sharing, consultation, and possible coordinated projects of China studies among the member organizations in the United States as well as in the rest of the world.

## **Organization:**

- 1. The membership of this council is organizational. The Council of USCS is made up of one representative from each of the six organizations.
- 2. These representatives are appointed by the chief executive officers (CEO) of the six organizations, that is, the "presidents" or "coordinators," and the governing bodies, i.e., the boards or steering committees. They report directly to the respective CEOs and to the respective governing bodies.
- **3.** The Council chairman is elected by the six representatives and serves a terminal two-year term. Ideally, the Council chairmanship rotates among the representatives of the six organizations.
- **4.** The Council may not interfere in the internal affairs of the participating organizations and institutions.
- **5.** Each of the participating organizations is expected to pay an annual fee of \$100 on a voluntary basis.
- **6.** USCS admits new members with the consent of four of its six founding members. Once admitted, the new member organizations enjoy the same privileges as the founding members.
- **7.** USCS will register in the Commonwealth of Kentucky as a non-profit organization.

### **Functions:**

- 1. The Council collects information from the member organizations and from the affiliated institutions.
- 2. The Council issues a USCS newsletter periodi-

- cally and maintains a website in which all member organizations' websites and the participating academic institutions will be linked. The website is maintained by somebody appointed by the Council.
- 3. The Council coordinates consultations about academic activities and fund raising among member organizations. The funds raised serve the sole purpose of USCS coordinated academic activities.
- 4. If funding is available, the Council may meet every year at a place that is desirable to all, such as the annual meeting of the Association for Asian Studies.
- 5. As USCS becomes more established at a later stage, the Council may organize joint projects such as research projects and conferences participated in by all, or some, of the member organizations. The participation by the USCS member organizations in the collaborated projects organized by the Council is entirely voluntary.
- 6. The USCS Council may invite experts in various fields as resource persons, such as legal counsels in the United States, in mainland China, and in Taiwan.
- 7. The Council chairman is expected to appoint a secretary/treasurer. The financial record is subject to scrutiny by all member organizations and affiliated institutions.
